3. At North Fairlington, the program will not be as extensive because of the lack of facilities. However, there will be an organized program under Mr. Hankin's direction, and a full-time assistant will be at the field. Games such as softball, volleyball and races will be supervised; as well as coloring, glider flying, finger painting, and story telling for the 6-12 year olds. (For softball league information see Part o of Paragraph 5).

4. Tennis courts are being operated on South Abingdon Street in North Fairlington, and South Utah and South Stafford Streets in South Fairlington. To meetimaintenance costs, a charge of 40 cents an hour per court is made; or season tickets may be purchased as follows: \$8 per family: \$8 for one adult: or \$1 for children under 16 (children must yield to adults on week ends).
