

Fairlington Acts in Emergency Food Collection

Are you helping to fill the food bins at Shirlington and the Centre Shopping Plaza? All Fairlingtonians are working together to do their bit to help meet the food emergency in Europe.

Under the direction of Mr. George McKibbin, assistant manager of Fairlington, the food bins have been erected. Mrs. Rufus Jasper has appointed Mrs. Raymond Pelissier as chairman of the organizations who are manning the bins during the week.

On Saturday, May 11, the members from the Fairlington Civic Association were at the bins to help place contributions and to accept donations of money for the cause. This money will be used to supply other canned foods.

On Monday, May 13, the Women's Circle of St. Clement's Church were in attendance. On Tuesday the League of Women Voters are in charge. On Wednesday, May 15, the Girl Scout leaders; on Thursday, May 16, members of the Fairlington School P.T.A.; on Friday the Women's Society for Christian Service, from the Methodist Community church; and on Saturday, May 18, the Fairlington - Parkfairfax Jewish

Community Group.

This is a county project and Mrs. Irving Hoddes is the county chairman with Mrs. Edmund Campbell co-chairman. The sponsorship of the entire project is the World Council of Churches under the direction of UNRA. All of the food collected is sent to the United Church Service Center, New Windsor, Maryland, and there packed and shipped abroad.

Money collections will be converted to money orders and forwarded to the Arlington County Emergency Food Collection. All individual check donations should be made payable to Arlington County Emergency Food Collection.

The Fairlington management has also arranged to service the bins and take the contributions to the Fairlington Methodist church each evening at 7 o'clock. There the Boy Scout troops of Fairlington, with the help of their dads, will sort the food collection and arrange for pick-up.

Specifications for food as outlined by UNRA are as follows:

All food must be in tins. Milk—condensed, evaporated or dedydrated. Meat. Fish. Peanut butter. Baby food (heavily concentrated). Baked beans. Stews. Soups (heavy, such as vegetable, beef,

Fairlington Civic Association Announces Active Committees

Ward Allen, an expert in the Division of International Organization Affairs in the U.S. State Department, described the workings of the United Nations Organization at the April meeting of the Fairlington Civic Association. Mr. Ward explained the functions of UNO's various sections and later answered questions from the audience. In the informal part of his talk Mr. Allen appealed for an attempt to understand Russia's viewpoint, and pointed out that Russia has much reason to be afraid of the United States and astounded at our attitude, as expressed by some of our representatives at San Francisco.

The first play of an infant organization, the Fairlington Little Theater Group, will be presented at the September meeting of the Civic Association, in cooperation with the Alexandria Little Theater, according to Mrs. Richard Buck, chairman of the Drama Committee. Mrs. Buck has been leading a drama study group here and this group recently worked with the Alexandria Little Theater to produce a play in Alexandria. The same play will be given here on the fourth Tuesday in September.

Saturday morning movies for children at the Centre Theater and a club for the youngsters who attend were reported by Mrs. Buck. The Civic Association cooperated with the Fairlington Parent-Teachers Association in promoting the Saturday morning shows. Mrs. Rufus Jasper, retiring president of the Fairlington P.T.A., explained that on questionnaires the children filled out many wrote that they liked acting in plays. Out of this has grown plans for a Junior Dramatic Group, which will be sponsored by the Drama Committee of the Civic Association and the P.T.A.

John Woodwarth reported for the Committees on Schools and Legislation and Legal Action that members of those committees, Mrs. John Kendall, president of the Civic Association, and others from Fairlington had attended the public hearing on the Arlington County budget, in April. These committees plan still more extended study of the county's needs for an expanded school program, an incinerator, libraries, improved health safeguards, and the county's financial status and prospects.

FIRE DEPARTMENT VOLUNTEERS

What action would you take if a fire should suddenly break out in your home?

Do you know the telephone number of the Fire Department?

Do you know the location of the fire alarm box nearest your home?

Do you know how to operate this box?

The Regular and Volunteer fire departments in your community are ever alert to provide protection for your property against fire. These activities are housed in a spacious Fire House on South Abingdon Street adjacent to the Fairlington Main Administration Building. In addition to this modern building there is a motor hose truck with many modern fire fighting accessories.

When a call to a fire is received the regular firemen on watch start the fire horn into action, mount the truck and proceed to the fire. The volunteer firemen are obligated to proceed independently to the scene of the fire. On arrival at the fire the entire group comes under the direction of the senior fireman there.

The Volunteer Firemen are essential because the county does not have sufficient funds to provide for the necessary personnel to operate all the fire equipment needed in the county. The Fairlington Volunteer Fire Department is an organization of men who realize their obligation to contribute time and effort towards the protection of property in this community. The organization is a democratic group composed of men from all walks of life. There are no professional qualifications, there is no compensation, however, the members are insured against accident. There is no age limit, however, in the case of minors parental consent is necessary. The total membership desired is 35-50. Due to the rapid turnover of personnel in this area, this number is rarely if ever realized.

The Volunteers devote much time to training and the improvement of the apparatus. This training conducted in a strictly conscientious and orderly fashion covers the operation of the apparatus and equipment, the accepted methods of fire prevention and extinction, the protection of property from fire, water and chemicals, salvage and last but not least, First Aid. No volunteer is qualified to operate with the company until he is pronounced fully qualified by the President and Fire Chief.

This community has been most fortunate not to have had a large number of fires, but that is no reason for optimism and not being adequately prepared and equipped. Your assistance is needed and your attendance at the Fire House is cordially invited. The volunteers meet every Monday night at 8 o'clock for drill, and instruction followed by a social hour. If you cannot find the time to attend all these meetings you might become affiliated with the organization and take the training offered there. At least, you will be able to help at fires and furthermore, you will gather the necessary instructions to organize your household so that pandemonium will not rule if unfortunately a fire occurs in your home.

In case of fire call OXford 2900, Branch 7, or TEmple 9817.

Fire alarm boxes are located throughout the community on telephone poles. The boxes are painted red and instructions as to their operation are printed on them. At night a red light indicates the location of the fire box.


